CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the theatre as a form of artistic, social and human expression, both from the point-of-view of the audience and the theatre artist. Attendance at live theatrical performances required. **Prerequisites:** none.

DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the discipline and art of the theatre. The elements of theatre (including analysis, criticism, acting, directing, design, and playwriting) will be introduced and experienced. During the course of the semester, students will have the chance to question themselves and the theatrical experience. Since each piece of theatre is representative of the society from which it springs, the course provides opportunities to examine the value of theatre as an art form in society, the values of the artists and societies that create theatre, and the student's personal values.

TEACHING METHOD:

This course combines lecture, class discussion, and experiential activities.

- Students are involved in the creation of a work of art by writing short play.

Students use both Critical and Creative Thinking Skills in the group design project and the playwriting assignment.

In-class Participation/Exercises

20%

Completion of in-class writing assignments and full participation in exercises/discussion all combine to make up this grade. A note on class discussions: make it a point to raise your hand at least twice each class period.

Homework 10%

This includes all out-of-class, non-project work assigned over the term. This will include on-line research of theatrical critiques.

Written Examinations

Midterm @ 10% and Final @ 10%

Examinations will cover assigned reading in *The Theatre Experience*, plays read, plays viewed, classroom lectures, guest lectures, discussions, and handouts. The exams are non cumulative.

Quizzes 10%

There will be 10 quizzes on the material you are assigned to read. These quizzes will cover the material (including plays) that you should have read for that particular day. Missed quizzes cannot be made up. Quizzes must be taken in ink.

Critiques 10% each

Each student will be required to attend one production and write a critique of it. The critique must be written according to the standard rules of composition. The paper should be a minimum of 3 pages in length (typed, double-spaced. Additional requirements will be provided. You may turn in critiques early. Your critique will be turned in via the dropbox on D2L. Late papers will not be accepted. Missing the production will automatically cause you to forfeit the opportunity to write a critique for the production. This show is fair game for quizzes, tests and discussion. The production to be critiqued is:

Les Liaisons Dangereuses - UWM Mainstage, Nov. 20 - 24

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Original Short Play

15%

Each student will write a short 3 to 4 page play according to guidelines that will be provided. The play must be typed and in appropriate script form. This project also includes character sketches and a short process paper.

Group Project: Design (final project) 15%

The class will divide into small groups to work as production teams on *Tartuffe*. Each team will have a group of three designers (costume, scenic, lighting). Each team member will write up an individual analysis of the play, then proceed with creative exploration. Each group will present its project to the class in a professional manner. The presentation must include visual support such as drawings, models, collages, etc.

COURSE POLICIES:

General Policies

- 1) CLASS D2L WEBSITE: D2L will be used extensively as a communication and resource tool for this course. Some written materials for this course will not be handed out, instead these materials will be posted on D2L in an effort to save money and "go green." Please get in the habit of checking the D2L course site daily.
- 2) **LAPTOPS/iPADS:** You are encouraged to bring your laptop to class to take notes and do research as assigned. From time to time, you will be required to turn off your laptop. Using your laptop for personal communication or activities unsanctioned by the instructor will result in a loss of all participation points for the day.

- 5) **FOOD/BEVERAGE:** Beverages are allowed in the classroom, but food is not.

Homework Policies:

- Turning in late work is strongly discouraged. An assignment is considered late if it is turned in any time after the class period has ended. LATE WORK: The grade for late work will be reduced by 20% for each class period that it is late. No work will be accepted after the last class period.
- 2) Most work will be turned in digitally unless the assignment guidelines state otherwise.
- 3) If you miss class for any reason, you must take the initiative to find out what material you have missed. You are still responsible for turning in all assignments on time. If you have to miss class due to required college business, you must alert the instructor and turn in all work early.

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Attendance/Lateness Policies:

- 1) This is a course, which requires the participation of everyone involved, because like theatre itself, it is designed as a collaborative learning process. Similar to an actor in a production who is late to rehearsal or does not show up, the student who misses a class session or who is late seriously weakens the collaborative process to the point that it is disruptive to the other students who attend the course.
- 2) **Perfect attendance is your goal**. Attendance is taken at each class. Class policy allows one absence, no questions asked. Each subsequent absence will lower your grade by one step (for example, a B+ will become a B). Two lates are equivalent to one absence.
- 3) If you must, please "save" your absence for when you really need it. If you must miss a class, please email and let the instructor know BEFORE CLASS if at all possible.
- **4) Arrive at class on time and be ready to go**. You will be considered late for class if you enter the room AFTER roll has been taken.
